### SUPPLEMENTAL LESSON 8: RECONCILIATION

What causes quarrels and what causes fights among you? Is it not this, that your passions are at war within you? <sup>2</sup> You desire and do not have, so you murder. You covet and cannot obtain, so you fight and quarrel. You do not have, because you do not ask. <sup>3</sup> You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on your passions. <sup>4</sup> You adulterous people! Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God? Therefore whoever wishes to be a friend of the world makes himself an enemy of God. <sup>5</sup> Or do you suppose it is to no purpose that the Scripture says, "He yearns jealously over the spirit that he has made to dwell in us"? <sup>6</sup> But he gives more grace. Therefore it says, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." <sup>7</sup> Submit yourselves therefore to God ... <sup>10</sup> Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you. **- James 4:1-7, 10**

### SUPPLEMENTAL LESSON 9: COMMITMENT

"Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." 32 This mystery is profound, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church. 33 However, let each one of you love his wife as himself, and let the wife see that she respects her husband. - Ephesians 5:31-33

TRUE COMMITMENT IS ROOTED IN DIVINE	
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- God's love for us is rooted in who He is, not who we are. (Psalm 117)
- Therefore, our love for our spouse is not to be rooted in who our spouse is (nor in who we are), but in who God is.

#### THE MARRIAGE COVENANT COMMITMENT

The marriage covenant is designed by God to be a lifelong fruitful relationship between a man and a woman. Marriage is a public vow to God and to one another to remain steadfast in unconditional love, reconciliation and sexual purity, while purposefully growing in the covenant marriage relationship.

- 2. Pursue your spouse in all seasons (Song of Solomon 8:6-7; 1 Corinthians 13:5).
- 3. Focus on the shared goal of knowing Jesus (Ephesians 5:25-27).



## SUPPLEMENTAL LESSON 10: EXPECTATIONS

Hope deferred makes the heart sick, but a desire fulfilled is a tree of life. - Proverbs 13:12

Expectations are beliefs about the way things will or be.
<ul> <li>They show up everywhere, ranging from what marriage should be like to what you plan on doing when you get home tonight.</li> <li>Are you aware of your expectations? What comes to mind?</li> </ul>
Left unchecked, your expectations will your marriage.
- Unchecked expectations make a healthy, happy (i.e. godly) marriage an impossibility.
The two typical responses to expectations  Demand them
WHAT SHOULD YOU DO WITH YOUR EXPECTATIONS?
Delight yourself in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart Psalm 37:4
Instead of asking "What do?" Try asking yourself "Am I wanting?"
When I disappoint my spouse's (or anyone's) expectations:
Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men Colossians 3:23
The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me? - Hebrews 13:6
Before asking "What does my spouse want from me?" Ask "What does God want from me?"
When your spouse (or anyone) disappoints your expectations:
your heart (Psalm 139:23-24)  Prayerfully evaluate your expectations, attitude and motivation.  Confess to God (e.g. your failure to hope in Him, forgive, etc.).
your spouse (Colossians 3:8, 12-13)
<ul> <li>your hopes (Ephesians 4:15)</li> <li>Lovingly communicate your hopes and desires, not as a condition to love, but as a way to deepen your love.</li> </ul>
