SERMON DEVOTIONAL STUDY

Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal His truth and wisdom as you go through this lesson.

1. Read Acts 12:20-24, and also look back at verses 1-5. What do we learn about Herod here?

"INDEED, ONE CANNOT FAIL to admire the artistry with which Luke depicts the complete reversal of the church's situation. At the beginning of the chapter Herod is on the rampage arresting and persecuting church leaders: at the end he is himself struck down and dies. The chapter opens with James dead, Peter in prison, and Herod triumphing; it closes with Herod dead, Peter free, and the Word of God triumphing. Such is the power of God to overthrow hostile human plans and to establish his own in their place. Tyrants may be permitted for a time to boast and bluster, oppressing the church and hindering the spread of the gospel, but they will not last. In the end their empire will be broken and their pride abased."

2. Additional details about Herod Agrippa from the Jewish historian Josephus were revealed in the sermon. What do the Scripture passage and these additional details together tell you about God's character as He dealt with this man?

- 3. Instead of crushing the church's existence, what did persecution of the church only serve to do? How are you encouraged by this, despite what you see around you?
- 4. In what ways are you building up your own image on the outside so others may be impressed or praise you?

"AGRIPPA DIDN'T SUDDENLY acquire the worms. He died suddenly because of them. How long had those worms been devouring the man from the inside? While he sat in haughty power over James before sentencing him to die? When he ordered the arrest of Peter and then played the pious king at Passover? When he laid plans to expand his holdings into Syria? No matter. His manner of death simply revealed his manner of living. A man eaten by worms presumed to sit in judgment over God's people, and he fell as quickly as he had risen."

5. What does it mean to "think rightly" about yourself and about God? What does that look like in everyday life?

6. Can we give God glory and at the same time accept a compliment for what we do? How did the sermon advise you going forward as you influence others for God's glory?

- 4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9) "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God: "Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
