Now a Jew named Apollos, a native of Alexandria, came to Ephesus. He was an eloquent man, competent in the Scriptures. He had been instructed in the way of the Lord. And being fervent in spirit, he spoke and taught accurately the things concerning Jesus, though he knew only the baptism of John. vv. 24-25

And when he wished to cross to Achaia, the brothers encouraged him and wrote to the disciples to welcome him. When he arrived, he greatly helped those who through grace had believed, for he powerfully refuted the Jews in public, showing by the Scriptures that the Christ was Jesus. vv. 27-28

REVEALING THE UNKNOWN GOD

DEVOTIONAL & HOME GROUP STUDY

Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal His truth and wisdom as you go through this lesson.

1. Read Acts 18:24-28. What were Apollos' strengths, both in his abilities and in his character?

"At the heart of a biblical attitude to the Word is a childlike eagerness to be fed. Peter urged, 'Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good' (1 Pet 2:2-3). This applies to both new and mature Christians. We are all disciples of Christ, which means we are all learners. The graciousness of the helper and the teachableness of the helpee give an environment conducive to great scholars taking the role of helpee and learning new truths."

2. What approach did Priscilla and Aquilla use "to explain the way of God more accurately" to Apollos? What are some other ways they could have confronted him that thankfully they did not?

3. How is the example of Priscilla and Aquilla one we should always try to emulate? How should we emulate Apollos?

4. Would you say that you're "doing the most" with what you have? How did the sermon help you see more possibilities for your life and ministry with what God has given you?

5. Which of the "share" items under *Therefore...* on the sermon notes do you feel most enthusiastic about? What is your plan to apply this to people you know?

6. Spend some time in reflection on this Scripture passage and the sermon. Ask the Holy Spirit to direct you in the way the Lord would have you live out what you've heard.

A WONDERFUL OFFER

Being a Christian isn't based on membership in a local church or keeping a set of rules. It involves a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and an understanding of who He is and what He has done to provide man with a way to experience God's love for us. Here's how to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior:

1. Realize that you are sinful and separated from God. (Romans 3:23; Isaiah 53:6)
2. Recognize that the penalty for your sin is death—eternal separation from God and all that is good. (Romans 6:23; Hebrews 9:27)
3. Understand that Jesus Christ took the penalty for your sin by dying in your place and that He rose again. (Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
4. Receive the free gift of salvation by trusting in Christ alone as your Savior. (Romans 4:4-5; Ephesians 2:8-9)
"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16 NASB) You can use this prayer to express your decision to God:
"Dear God, I know that I am a sinner. I believe that Jesus Christ died on the cross for me and rose from the dead. I trust in Him alone as the only way to get right with You. Thank You for the forgiveness of sins and the eternal life I now have. Amen."
